Learn about Local Community Science Birding Projects

Join us in room 111 of Harlan Hall (WNMU) for a program on our outstanding local community science projects. Organizers John Gorey and Linda Moore will cover details and how to get involved with local Christmas Bird Counts (CBCs) as well as the Winter Raptor Survey. Data collected through these projects provide researchers, biologists, and wildlife agencies with valuable information to gauge the health of bird populations and thus inform action. Plus, these are great ways to get outside with fellow bird enthusiasts. Come and find out if these research projects are up your alley!

62nd Annual Silver City CBC Saturday, December 16th

FIELD TRIPS

Saturday, 18th November Lake Roberts

Meet 7am at WNMU Fine Arts Center south parking lot, convoying/carpooling to Lake Roberts at 7:15am. We will be expecting a range of duck species, possibly with other water birds such as cormorants and grebes.

The water fringes should hold a range of sparrows, and with luck we may see a late osprey or an early eagle. Expect to be back in Silver City around 1pm. Trip leader: Brian Dolton.

Sunday, 3rd December Mangas Springs

Meet 7:30am at WNMU Fine Arts Center south parking lot, convoying/carpooling to Mangas Springs at 7:45am. Mangas Springs offers a variety of habitat in a small area and can turn up interesting birds at any time of year. We should be scolded by marsh wrens, and may hear rails in the marsh, while the trees shelter yellow-rumped warblers, kinglets, and a variety of woodpeckers. Cranes occasionally feed here, and snipe can be found if the fields are muddy, while vermilion flycatchers sometimes stay for winter. Expect to be back in Silver City around noon. CONSERVATION IS KEY

Florida Mountains Dolomite Mine

The federal lawsuit by Friends of the Floridas, Gila Resources Information Project, and other groups challenging the Bureau of Land Management's (BLM) approval of a proposed dolomite mine in the Florida Mountains received a hearing before the presiding judge on July 12, 2023, but (as of October 20, 2023) no decision on the case has been issued. A decision is likely to be issued sometime in the next couple of months. The case involves the proposed American Magnesium mine on

public land adjacent to the Florida Mountains Wilderness Study Area. In August 2023, the BLM issued a notice seeking comment on a small expansion to the project that would include a new staging area and an extension of the proposed access road. If the currently pending lawsuit is successful, the BLM will need to go back to the drawing board and fully and lawfully review both the original project proposal and the proposed expansion. **Other documents related to the mining project can be found on the BLM's official website.**By Dave Becker


Meet Our Elected Officers

She admires the way local Audubon is helping students and the community learn more about birds and the environment that supports them. Susan also enjoys gardening and volunteers with local music and arts groups.

Birding for Everybody and Every Body

While SWNM Audubon believes that birding is for everybody, not everybody can easily go birding around here. Many local birding spots require climbing into canyons, crossing creeks, or hiking along uneven terrain. So, we're starting conversations about the accessibility of natural areas and ways to bring the benefits of birding to all of our members. Our October 8th Big Sit event at Silva Creek was designed with this in mind.

According to the organizer, SWNM Audubon programs committee member Emily Pollom, "The Big Sit is important because it highlights not only community science but also the ways that community science hasn't been accessible, but could be."

The Big Sit, founded in 1992 by the New Haven (CT) Bird Club, challenges participants to identify birds they see irom a 17-foot diameter circle. Ninety-eight Big Sit circles registered this year, including one in Guatemala and one in Azerbaijan. Ours was the only one in New Mexico.

Emily praised the Gila Native Plant Society for their care in making Silva Creek Botanical Garden an accessible space, an ideal location for our first Big Sit. In this year's inaugural event, participants identified 26 species, including five different woodpeckers. We plan to make this event an annual tradition for hanging out with old and new friends and finding birds.

SWNM Audubon will continue to share resources and ideas to help our birding community become more

welcoming to everyone. Led by Emily, Board members have completed comprehensive checklists of the accessibility features of several local birding spots, including Mangas Springs, Iron Bridge, Silva Creek, San Vicente, Big Ditch Trail, Little Cherry Creek, Gila River Preserve/Lichty Center, and River Ranch Wildlife Management Area. These checklists are now available on the **Birdability** map, allowing people to access this information ahead of time, and to help them decide if a location is one they would like to visit.

We also plan to continue this commitment MORE..... through:

- Providing accessible events (e.g., the Big Sit)
- Posting accessibility information in our bird outing announcements and on our Birding Locations web page
- Expanding the collection of Birdability maps for hot spots in our region
- Supporting groups and organizations seeking to improve the accessibility of natural areas in our region
